1: "BECAUSE PROGRESS STARTS BEING OPEN" Location: Next to the Novartis Campus Map The company may have realized that in times of pandemics and global energy crises, profits do not necessarily generate sympathy. And a positive image and media coverage seem to matter to Novartis. In October 2022, Novartis opened its companyowned campus to the public.

2: INTRODUCTION

Location: Koi Pond / In Front of the Visitor Center Here we are, surrounded by architectural megabuildings by 15 international architects that were invited by Novartis to create a city within a city, "a campus area for research, with innovation, knowledge and meetings".







3: PHARMACEUTICAL & EDUCATIONAL FEMINIST HISTORIES Location: Curie Street

The first female* student admitted to the University of Basel was Emilie Frey, who studied medicine from 1890 and received her doctorate in 1896.

4: (POST)COLONIAL LEGACIES Location: The Physic Garden

We are here in "The Physic Garden", a structural installation by landscape architect Thorb-jörn Andersson. The garden is home to 32 different species of medical plants and directly references the campus' historical connection to a Celtic settlement.





6: CLINICAL TRIALS -A QUEER FEMINIST CRITIQUE Location: Inside the Olafur Eliasson's **Sculpture**



The pharmaceutical industry shapes our understanding of health, driving narratives of what is deemed as healthy or unhealthy through advertising, non-commercial partnerships and health care provider engagement. In feminist literature the idea that women* experience 'atypical' symptoms is often interrogated using Rawlinson's concept of the invisible gendering of the universal.

5: MANUFACTURING -A HISTORICAL OUTLINE ON **ECOLOGICAL IMPACTS** Location: Next to the Rhine

Basel, with its direct access to the Rhine, was particularly suitable for the chemical and was particularly suitable for the chemica public demonstrations, new safety and environmental protection measures were introduced. However, dangerous types of production still exist, but have been outsourced to other countries such as India or China.



7: THE END Location: Inside the Inner **Circle of Novartis Pavillon** The Swiss pharmaceutical industry is rooted in patriarchal, sexist, classist and racist sources of ideology.

Whether it is the historical patriarchal character of the industry, the restricted view of gender as exclusively binary, the outsourcing of production facilities to

countries with low wage costs and barely existing safety precautions, the high cost of many medications and the resulting exclusion of people in financial need, or the encouragement of people to participate in risky clinical trials.
